Directions to Camp

From North: Rt 209 to Rt 17 West to Monticello. Follow directions below.

From East: Rt 84 to Rt 17 West to Monticello. Follow directions below

Take exit 104 off Rt 17 - Monticello Raceway exit. Continue along Rt 17B for 8 miles, through the Village of White Lake. Turn left on Rt 55 towards Eldred. Go four miles to County Road 26. Turn right on County Road 26 towards Narrowsburg. Follow approximately four miles to the SECOND RIGHT TURN into the Ten Mile Rive Camps Reservation. (Do not turn at the first sign, that is for Camp Keowa).

Note: The proper turn is at the bottom of a small hill and is a SHARP RIGHT TURN.



Conclave Code of Conduct

1. Observe the Scout Oath, the Scout Law, the Explorer Code, and the Order of the Arrow Obligation.
2. Wear the official uniform and conclave identification during the entire weekend.
3. Attend all planned training sessions, meals, and special programs.
4. Do not disrupt any part of the program by patch trading. All patch trading is confined to free periods unless otherwise indicated in the schedule.
5. Be personally responsible for breakage, damage, and loss of property.
6. Observe quiet hours and "lights out" from midnight to 7AM.
7. Dispose of all trash and remove all personal gear prior to leaving.
8. Understand that the purchase, or consumption of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs at the Conclave will not be permitted. This standard will apply to all participants, both youth and adult.
9. Respect the state and county laws as well as camp regulations prohibiting the use of fireworks, firearms, and gambling.
10. Park any and all vehicles in the parking areas as designated. Cars are not allowed in campsites.
11. Maintain an appropriate demeanor at all times.
12. Be at all times the considerate guest of a considerate host - Camp Ranachqua/Hudson-Delaware Council, Boy Scouts of America.

CONCLAVE TRAINING

At this year's Conclave, the C.O.C. has decided to hold the following 12 training sessions, which we feel will benefit all of the lodges and brothers in the section. Each brother will be able to attend 3 training sessions, and each session will only be offered once.

The sessions have been grouped into the following three categories to aid brothers in making their selections, however, they are not restricted (all brothers may attend a session designed for lodge leaders, etc.):

- A-sessions designed for all Arrowmen
- L-sessions designed for Lodge and Chapter Leaders
- M-session designed for new Arrowmen

Each session has been assigned a number code (N1, A4, etc.). Please enter the codes of your top five choices on your registration form. You will be registered in three of these sessions based on availability.

Brothers who plan on attending the Outdoor Cooking Mega-Event will only attend two training sessions, but still must indicate five choices.

We are also offering a workshop on Running an LLDC all morning long. If you would like to attend this session, please contact your Lodge Chief and acquire his permission, as this is only offered to two youth brothers from each lodge. Enter the code for this session, and put an X in the other four spaces. Brothers attending this session cannot attend the Outdoor Cooking Mega-Event.

Adults' Role in the O.A.- This session geared for all Arrowmen will cover the basics of an adult's responsibilities to his unit and the Order, as well as the more advanced theories of advisory roles. A1

Operating an A.S.K. Program- The A.S.K. (Arrowmen Sharing Knowledge) Program is a very important aspect of the O.A.'s role in troop program, yet it is still not available in many lodges. This session will help to provide brothers with information on how to create A.S.K. in their lodges, as well as to provide a forum for idea exchange for lodges with existing programs. L1

Working With Adults- A session designed to offer tips to youth Arrowmen in working with their advisors and other adult Brothers, including methods of dealing with the occasional domineering adult. A2

The Brotherhood Hike- This popular session deals with the implementation of the Brotherhood Hike (the meditational procession of Brotherhood candidates to the ceremony itself). It will also cover the other aspects of the Brotherhood induction process, and act as a forum for idea exchange on the subject. A3

Where Do I Belong- An orientation session for brothers who are new to the Order attending the Conclave. Helps to answer these brothers' questions and inform them of their role in Scouting and the opportunities available to them through the OA. N1

Summer Camp Promotion- Deals with the different methods of summer camp promotion, as well as the role of the lodge in promotions. This session also provides a forum for idea exchange on the subject. A4

Creating a Quality "Where To Go Camping Guide"- Covers the purpose for producing a "WTGC" guide, and the methods of constructing a quality guide. It will also allow for idea exchange between the lodges. A5

The Lodge's Place in Council Operations- This session covers the role of the lodge, and the lodge's Key 3, in the operation of the council. Includes the lodge's role in the Camping Committee and Executive Board, as well as its place in providing staff for council and district events. L2

Effective Unit Elections- Discusses methods on how to establish impressive teams, and how to perform the election as accurately and professionally as possible. Also allows for idea exchange between the lodges on administrative methods. A6

How To Orient New Brothers Successfully- This very popular and important session discusses the necessity for all new Arrowmen to be properly informed of the Order, their place in it, and the opportunities available to them through it. It covers several methods of performing this orientation, and allows for lodges to share information on the subject. Not an orientation for new brothers, but rather an instruction session for experienced brothers on how to run one. L3

Keeping Accurate Records- Covers the importance of keeping various records accurately (minutes, treasurer's report, etc.), and the different methods of doing so, including the importance of computerization. L4

OA Publicity- This popular session covers various ways of making the achievements and purpose of the OA known to both the Scouting community and local community. Also allows for brothers to share their ideas on the topic. A7

Running an LLDC- This workshop will take place during all three training blocks, and is limited to two youth brothers per lodge. Covers the importance of holding an LLDC (Lodge Leadership Development Conference), and how to run and staff this conference. The final decision of which brothers will attend this session from each lodge will be made by the Lodge Chief. Attendance by every lodge is mandatory. L5

OUTDOOR COOKING MEGA-EVENT

OBJECTIVE OF THIS SESSION:

The objective of this activity is to provide a hands-on opportunity for arrowmen to expand their knowledge in the area of outdoor cooking. Providing a learning opportunity as such will encourage arrowmen to go on to share these newly-learned skills with their troops, camps, and fellow outdoor enthusiasts, thus promoting Scouting activities--one of the primary duties of an OA member. Arrowmen will be given the unique opportunity to learn, develop, and share* advanced cooking skills in the areas of: large scale outdoor cooking, dutch oven cooking/baking, wilderness survival/utensil-less cooking, low impact cooking, gourmet cooking, etc. This is not a basic Scouting Skills activity, but rather an advanced course designed for Honor Campers.

METHOD OF OPERATION:

This is a hands-on activity for a limit of 100 brothers. Upon their arrival to the area, the participants are given a short briefing on the menu and styles of cooking available. They then decide on what items they would like to begin cooking, and go to that area to begin work with a staff member. Participates may, and are encouraged to, try as many styles of cooking or dishes as they wish. Each participant will, during the course of the activity, make a shish-ca-bob, and work on at least one other item. Large items such as turkeys and cakes, as well as gourmet dishes like flank fish and chicken cordons, are shared among the participates, so that all can "get a taste" of all the different styles.

The system of instruction for this activity is quite simple. Instructors use only as much time in explanation and demonstration as is minimally necessary, allowing for the greatest opportunity for participates to "do it themselves". The instructors work right along side of the participates, coaching and assisting as necessary, to ensure that the operation runs smoothly and that the arrowmen can learn as much as possible.

MENU:

APPETIZERS: Homemade pizza delicately seasoned and embellished*, Crisped, soft, fluffy buttermilk biscuits and crescent rolls, Authentic mild and spicy Mexican tacos, boritos, and tortillas, Seasoned oriental beef, pork, and vegetable stir-fries, Korean style spicy and mild chicken steamed amidst rice, Authentic American Indian style baked corn-on-the-cob, Gourmet style chicken cordon bleu deluxe, cooked to perfection, Exquisitely smoked, gourmet style fresh fish and muscles, Trail style, burn proof, complete meal cooked in aluminum foil, Deluxe meals and "finger lickin'" spare ribs in aluminum foil,

Difficult but delicious flank of fish roasted in a paper bag, Wilderness survival style egg sandwiches fried on a hot rock, Hard and soft boiled eggs cooked in paper cups and orange peels, Hamburgers, etc. fried on hot rocks and roasted in orange peels,

ENTREES: Roasted shish-ca-bobs marinated in secret sauce, Large, moist turkey roasted underground to a delicious crisp, Gourmet style suckling Cornish game hens roasted to perfection, "Grandma's old fashioned" beef and vegetable hunter's stew, Deliciously moist chicken delicately roasted in a butter sauce, "Southern style" crispy fried chicken and flavored chicken soup, "Outdoorsmen's" pot roast flavored in bacon with vegetables, Gourmet pig exquisitely roasted whole to a delicate crisp, Whole rabbits roasted on a split (tastes just like chicken)

DESSERTS: Chewy style chocolate chip and peanut butter cookies, Moist, baked cherry and peach cobblers flavored to taste, "Frontier style" homemade, hand cranked ice cream, Sweetly iced chocolate and vanilla cakes, Up-side-down cake embellished with pineapples and brown sugar, Luscious, gourmet style fresh bananas dipped in melted chocolate, Apples baked to perfection, seasoned with cinnamon and raisins, "Country fair style" funnel cakes lightly powdered with sugar, "Policemen's special" donuts fried in oil with powdered sugar, "Window sill cooled" apple and cherry pies crisply baked, Light and fluffy crumb cake topped with sweet brown sugar,

* -Baked in dutch, reflector, or underground ovens
-Cooked without, or virtually without, utensils

Most items requiring pots are cooked in dutch ovens or other similar cook ware. Virtually all utensils used can be purchased through B.S.A.
